

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC'S CONSTITUTION ABOUT FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS, DUTIES AND GUARANTEES



Article 39.- Right to equility. All people are born free and equal before the law, receive the same protection and treatment from institutions, authorities and other people and enjoy the same rights, freedoms and opportunities, without any discrimination based on gender, color, age, disability, nationality, family ties, language, religion, political or philosophical opinion, social or personal status.

Right of women to a life free of violence

Productive value of domestic work

The de facto union


Equal pay for work;

Historical Context

- In the last decades in our country various laws have been approved to adapt our legal framework to the commitments assumed by the State, through international agreements aimed at protecting rights, guaranteeing economic empowerment, and increasing their social and economic participation of women.
- The Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action (1995) on the economic, political and social conditions of women in the Dominican Republic showed great inequalities and the absence of public policies for the role of women to transcend the family.











In higher education, the difference in favor of women is much greater: in 2011, for every 100 men enrolled there were 172 women.




Assistance programs for agricultural producers (Surprise Visits) with a gender approach

Rural women have a higher level of associativity than men. In community projects such as roads or technological centers they benefit more.



National Programs with a Gender Approach



- Decree No. 974-01 of created The Office of Gender Equality and Development with a seat in all State sectors.
- Law No. 176-07 of the National District and Municipalities. Article 21. Destination of the Funds. 4% dedicated to educational, gender and health programs.
- Resolution No. 2751-2010 Approving the Regulation for the application of the Gender Equality Policy in the Judiciary.
- Law I-I2 of END 2030 and Decree I34-I4, which regulates the application thereof; Phase I: Address the mainstreaming of the gender equality approach; Phase 2: Reinforcement of institutional learning; Phase 3: Piloting experience in eight public institutions; Phase 4: Formalization of institutional coordination committees; Phase 5: Preparation of documents by national specialists; and Phase 6: Technical assistance from international experts on gender-sensitive indicators and budgets.



Transversalization of the Gender Approach in Drug Policies







It is a governmental institution with legal personality, dependent on the Executive Power. Its mission is to design and implement national policies against the consumption, distribution and trafficking of drugs and at the same time develop prevention strategies through education, guidance and training.

Its main objectives are: to advise the Executive Power on the issue of drugs in the Dominican Republic; review, design, develop and implement national strategies and campaigns against the consumption, distribution and trafficking of illicit drugs; and promote the coordination of all public and private sectors to stop drug trafficking at the national level.

NATIONAL POLICIES FOR THE PREVENTION OF DRUG CONSUMPTION



The Dominican Republic is a signatory to the Anti-Drug Strategy in the Hemisphere, our National Strategy is part of the fulfillment of the international commitments assumed by the country. These commitments are reflected in the signature and ratification by the Dominican Republic of the International Conventions both within the United Nations and in the Inter-American sphere, as well as in their active participation in international organizations specializing in drugs: the Office of the United Nations for the Control of Drugs and Crime (UNODC), the International Narcotics Control Board (INCB), the Caribbean Financial Action Group against Money Laundering (CFATF) and the Inter-American Commission for the Control of Abuse of drugs (CICAD / OAS). Likewise, this strategy takes into account the recommendations made to the country within the framework of the Multilateral Evaluation Mechanism (MEM) of CICAD / OAS.



- The National Strategic Plan on Drugs 2016-2020
- "Gender Equality: It implies the recognition of the principle of equality before the law and in the exercise of the political, economic, social and cultural rights of all, citizens, in the legal basis, of public policies, strategies and plans to face the supply and consumption of addictive substances ".
- Agreement between the National Council of Drugs and the Ministry of Women, raises gender mainstreaming and drug prevention in the projects and programs of both institutions
- Preliminary Draft Law: General Law Equality and Non-Discrimination will have the objective of preventing and eliminating the different forms of discrimination that are practiced against people in a general sense, its content puts special emphasis on the following populations: Women, children and adolescents, people with disabilities, elderly people, LGTBIQ + community, sex workers, people living with HIV (PLHIV), migrants, people who use drugs, people living in extreme poverty, people deprived of their liberty, because of their particular situations of vulnerability due to the discrimination they suffer when it comes to accessing social services and exercising their status as citizens.

Gender-sensitive drug prevention programs



- The National Council of Drugs in coordination with UNODC and the Ministry of Education, carry out a 3-year pilot project called "Building Strong Families in the Dominican Republic", aimed at family psychoeducation, in which the focus of the gender from different scope:
- Strong Families (contains the gender approach in a transversal way)
- Parental Skills (contains a complete session of gender equity)
- Building Families (contains the gender approach in a transverse way)
