

EU Action Plan on Drugs 2017-2020

Gender sensitive action in prevention, treatment, harm reduction, alternative development (among other measures):

- Take into account of gender-specific needs (assessment)
- Improve the availability and effectiveness of evidence-based interventions
- Exchange best practices (within the EU and internationally)

Indicators:

- Extent of increase in the number of gender specific programmes
- ✓ Number of evaluated projects that demonstrate positive outcomes



UNODC STRATEGY FOR GENDER EQUALITY AND THE EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN (2018–2021)

- Establishes the first institutional framework on gender equality for the United Nations Office at Vienna/United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNOV/UNODC).
- One of its aims is ensuring that United Nations standards to promote and achieve gender equality are met.
- It provides a systematic framework that sets institutional standards and defines commitments on gender equality and the empowerment of women for the period 2018–2021.







Adoption of the gender approach for the empowerment of women as a cross-cutting matter in drugs policy


Responds to the request extended by the EU-CELAC Mechanism, to review how the gender approach, focussing on the empowerment on women, can be introduced –in practical terms- in all areas of drugs policy, considering:

- the current situation regarding women and drugs
- the available evidence on effective interventions













Adoption of the gender approach for the empowerment of women as a cross-cutting matter in drugs policy

Aim: presenting a solid update on how to mainstream, comprehensively, the gender perspective for women empowerment in all areas of drugs policy:

- Prevention
- Treatment
- Harm reduction
- Rehabilitation & social insertion/integration
- Criminal Justice & alternatives to prison for drug-related offences
- Alternative development

The report should respond to the question:

What does it means the cross-cutting consideration of the gender approach and the empowerment of women in drugs policy?





Adoption of the gender approach for the empowerment of women as a cross-cutting matter in drugs policy

2017: Exploring potential interest in countries, universities and other stakeholders, to present a work-plan proposal...

- Leadership: National Drugs Board of Uruguay (JND)
- Definition of objectives and methodology

2018:

- Bibliographic review
- Invitation to participate to all countries active in COPOLAD
- Baseline study responding 26 countries: Argentina, Barbados, Belize, Brasil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominica, Ecuador, El Salvador, Spain, Grenada, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Portugal, Dominican Republic, Santa Lucia, Suriname, Trinidad&Tobago and Uruguay
- First draft
- Setting up Editorial Advisory Board







Adoption of the gender approach for the empowerment of women as a cross-cutting matter in drugs policy

Next steps: To finalize the first draft, including, among other consultations:

- The inputs and outcomes from the 3rd COPOLAD II Annual Conference
- Experts revision of the first draft
- Review by the Editorial Advisory Board (all National Drug Agencies of contributing countries plus the collaborating networks of COPOLAD)
- Final draft
- Editing in English and Spanish
- Dissemination
